## Chuuk Corps Community Center

The Chuuk Corps Community Center on Weno Island, in the Federated States of Micronesia, has growing and vibrant programs offered to their community. These include active youth programs, such as after school/music programs, and adult programs including women's ministries, community care ministries and life skills programs that benefit

both men and women. The life skills programs for adults include important vocational training -- such as gardening, food and nutrition, and sewing classes. The corps officers have also provided this training to officers/ soldiers in Pohnpei, which has proven to be very beneficial to the Pohnpei Corps.

The Chuuk Corps has vision for furthering its ministry, but due to lack of funds and aging equipment, fulfilling this vision is challenging. The corps is in tremendous need of both funding and supplies that will help the ministry not only survive but thrive! For a gift of \$10,000, incredible improvements

> would be possible. These are a few of the projects: mercy seat in the chapel, chairs, water catchment tank covers, basketball backboards, table tennis equipment, and new kitchen cabinets. These updates will allow the corps to expand its programming in areas of ministry and fellowship. Future generations will benefit, as lasting relationships are developed, the gospel is shared, and spiritual growth through occurs programs, fellowship and community.

Kolonia and Madolenihmw Corps on Pohnpei Island, in the Federated States of Micronesia, have had after school programs for 27 and 23 years respectively. In late 2018, Kolonia lost its building, thus the corps officers were forced to hold meetings in the quarters, including the critical after school program. To add to this challenge, in the summer of 2019, the

> Kolonia Corps had to give up the lease on the quarters, when property owners demanded an exorbitant increase in the lease amount, or purchase of the property. The officers moved the quarters to the Madolenihmw Sunday School/office building and the Kolonia Corps Officers transport their people to the other side of the island to meet

Pohnpei State Corps (Kolonia and Madolenihmw)

in Madolenihmw. This continues, as the officers attempt to work with the government to find another property for their Kolonia congregation.



Even with these incredible difficulties, the after school and corps programs continue with the officers and staff leading and transportation providina to the children and teens. For a gift of \$10,000 we can provide the Kolonia and Madolenihmw Corps with funding for a muchneeded lunch program that will offer a daily meal to 60+ ව attendees. In this program,

women are taught important life skills to help provide for their families. To aid with this critical after school program, the Kolonia and Madolenihmw Corps are in great need of three desktop computers to help the community college students in the area. The College of Micronesia FSM now requires classes to be done online. In the Madolenihmw community, very few students have computers or internet connection. The corps have college students who not only

attend their programs, but provide help and leadership in the youth programs of the corps. These college students are being mentored and discipled by the corps officers to be good local leaders in the community. For a gift of \$10,000, this corps can purchase vital tools to reach college



students Access to desktop computers would be a key tool in building a bridge to a better future, developing strong relationships with new students, and showing the love of Jesus Christ to our brothers and sisters.
