The Hopeful Light of Christmas


My favorite thing about Christmas is the Christmas lights. There is something about the beauty and the warmth these lights provide, especially on a cold, dark winter night. In the evenings after all my family has gone to bed, I love to just sit in front of the Christmas tree and admire the lights.

Just like Christmas lights brighten dark, cold, winter night skies, the birth of Jesus came as a great light. Isaiah prophesied about Christ's coming when he wrote about the dawning of a great light. Isaiah prophesied about Christ's coming and he wrote about the dawning of a great light. Isaiah 9:2 says, *The people who walk in darkness will see a great light. For those who live in a land of deep darkness, a light will shine.* The darkness is the sin-filled world and it represents no hope and no joy. But with the coming of Christ the Savior of the world, the world was filled with the light of His love. He brought light into the darkness.

On a dark night while the shepherds were watching their sheep, like they did every night, their routine was interrupted. A bright light disturbed their peace! Before them stood an angel of the Lord (Luke 2:9). The darkness is gone; the light is overwhelming. The shepherds are startled, rubbing their eyes and squinting from the brightness. Through the light the shepherds hear these words: *"The Savior—yes the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David! And you will recognize him by this sign: You will find a baby wrapped snugly in strips of cloths, lying in a manger."* (Luke 2:11-12).

Just as their eyes are adapting to the light, it gets brighter. Not just one angel is there, but a vast number of angels who were praising God and saying, *"Glory to God in highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom God is pleased."* (Luke 2:14)

Why the significance of light in the Christmas story? John tells us that *"The Word gave life to everything that was created, and his life brought light to everyone. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness can never extinguish it"* (John 1:4-5). Just as Christmas lights brighten a dark and wintery night, Christ's light brightens a dark, sin-filled world.
